SYLLABUS FOR APTITUDE TEST B.ARCH/B.PLANNING

Part – I: Awareness of persons, places, Buildings, Materials, Objects, Texture related to architecture and build-environment. Visualising three dimensional objects from two dimensional drawings. Visualising, different sides of three-dimensional objects. Analytical Reasoning Mental Amility (Visual, Numerical and Verbal).

Part II: Three dimensional – perception: Understanding and appreciation of scale and proportion of objects, building forms and elements, colour texture, harmony and contrast. Design and drawing of geoketrical or abstract shapes and patterns in pencil. Transformation of forms both 2D and 3 D union, substraction, rotation, development of surfaces and volumes, Generation of Plan, elevations and 3 D views of objects. Crating two dimensional and three dimensional compositions using given shapes and forms.

Sketching of scenes and activitids from memory of urnanscape (public space, market, festivals, street scenes, monuments, recreational spaces etc.), Landscape (river fronts, jungles, gardens trees, plants etc.) and rural life.
